**Total Base Contract** 

April 2, 1942	Proposal for Airbase at Newport.
May 8, 1942	Official announcement for Newport Army Air Corps Airfield Training Base.
June 1, 1942	Work started by Corps of Engineers on runways, ramps and taxiways with auxiliary fields at Weldon, Elgin and Milltown to be smarter later. Proposed to house 600 cadets and 1000 enlisted men.
July 30, 1942	Contract with Nelson Concrete Culvert Co. of Champagne, IL to set up plant at Campbell Station to make 7000 tons of concrete pipe within 60 days.
Aug 3, 1942	500 local workers to be hired to keep flight school in operation.
Aug 10, 1942	Lt. Col. Daniel Cooper sets up temporary command at Newport Armory on Second St.
Aug 11, 1942	1 <sup>st</sup> plane delivered to Newport for Lt. Col. Cooper's use during construction stage.
Aug 18, 1942	Railroad spur completed.
Oct 5, 1942	1st enlisted personnel arrive at base.
Oct 6, 1942	Fuel contract for base awarded to Flotation Systems, Los Angeles CA.

Oct 10, 1942	Contract for Milltown Auxiliary Airfield awarded to C.H. Peterson Co., Minneapolis MN
Oct 15, 1942	Contract for auxiliary airfields at Erwin's Switch and Amagon awarded to McGarry Bros., St. Cloud MN.
Oct 24, 1942	Staff HQ moved from Armory to the Airbase.
Oct 30, 1042	Tornado causes considerable damage at Airfield construction site.
Dec 28, 1942	1st cadets arrive for training.
Dec 31, 1942	USO Center opens at Armory.
Jan 21, 1943	1st cadet and instructor killed in crash near Hoxie.
Feb 6, 1943	Cadet becomes 1st member of Caterpillar Club as he bails out of a trainer near Harrisburg.
Feb 10, 1943	1st mechanic loses his life in accident on the ramp.
April 29, 1943	1st Newport cadet class graduates.


BT-13's flew out of Newport but also used auxiliary fields through out Jackson County. One auxiliary runway complex was south of town and was later used for U of AAG experiment station






